Good Shepherd Lutheran Church Annual Meeting Minutes February 4, 2018

- 1. Call To Order Church Board President Tom Golden (11:50 a.m.)
- 2. Opening Prayer Pastor Chris Enstad
- 3. <u>Quorum</u> Vice President Deanne Boss and Secretary Josh Enslin confirmed at least 75 people were present at the meeting.
- 4. <u>Approval of Minutes from the 2017 Annual Meeting</u> Motion, 2nd from the congregation Motion Passes.
 - 5. Stewardship Presentation: Dream, Impact, Amplify Katie Wagner, Tyler Gold
 - *Good Shepherd's past and current ministries were outlined; future ideas were previewed as well.
 - 6. Lead Pastor's Report: Past, Present, Future (Pastor Chris Enstad)
 - *Joshua the story of Jericho was reviewed as it relates to our story at Good Shepherd.
- *The Joshua Group will assist us with a strategic plan and provide tools for us to use to help provide a shared vision and mission. We also will receive guidance with how to fund our ministries.
- *There is new development close to our church how can we be ready to welcome them into our family.
 - *In a divided world, we need to show a reconciled congregation.
 - *Thank you goes out to the treasurer, the church staff, pastors, and church members.
 - 7. Church Board President's Report (Tom Golden)
 - *2017 Past: What type of impact has Good Shepherd made in 2017?
 - *Background: there was a deficit budget, a new senior pastor, and staff changes.
 - *12 committees were formed with 120 total members (summarized in the Annual Report).
 - *Our financial condition has strengthened, our staff is strong, and ministries continue to grow.
- *We still need to improve the database to get accurate member counts, but we should continue to focus on positive ministry work.
 - 8. Presentation: Good Shepherd's impact Kelly Knueve
 - 9. Presentation and Approval of 2017 Financial Report Treasurer Linda Zimdars
- *Thank you and acknowledgment: to the dedicated people who count the offering money, to the church staff, and to the finance committee.
- *Linda summarized the 2016 Wegner account review. There will be changes that will show various programs included on one statement. The statements will also include designated/temporarily restricted funds.
 - *2017 Financial Overview:
 - -Total Revenues minus temporarily restricted funds \$2,397,502
 - -Total Expenses minus temporarily restricted expenses \$2,043,001
 - -Total Unrestricted Surplus \$108,480
 - -Mission in Motion Surplus \$246,042
 - -Capital Expenditures \$352,937

9. (cont'd)

*2017 Operating Results:

- -Income that was received was higher than anticipated through pledge cards and seasonal giving projections that exceeded the budget.
- -Expenses were less than expected with savings in salaries, benefits, and insurance.
- -Music/Worship expenses were higher is 2017 due to the purchase of hymnals.
- -Youth Ministry/Confirmation income and expenses showed an increase due to the change in account ing procedures for restricted funds.
- -A large principal reduction of \$50,000 to mortgage principal balance was made in November.
- -The church mortgage balance was reduced from \$3,602,919 to \$3,419,312, making a \$183,607 principal reduction.
- -Parking lots at both campuses were repaved and repaired in 2017 for \$60,000, which was paid from the 2016 sale of the Verona land to the City of Verona.
- -A mortgage payment reserve certificate of deposit was established for six months of principal and interest payments on the mortgage, totaling \$137,000.
- -An additional operating reserve certificate of deposit was established for \$100,000.
- *Motion to accept the 2017 financial report and 2nd from the congregation Motion Passes.

10. Columbarium Report - Steve Frei

- *Dedicated three years ago.
- *Columbarium update The board met three times in 2017 with the focus on monitoring columbarium records, finances, promotion, maintenance, updating our policies and regulations, and strategically considering the long term needs of the columbarium.
- *Phase 2 update: landscaping enhancement in 2018. Question from congregation: Why are there two price points? Steve Frei: The upper rows sell easier.
- *The Columbarium Board was highlighted.

11. What type of impact does Good Shepherd hope to make in 2018 - Eric Holmer

-Director of Media: helping to tell Good Shepherd's story.

Systemize:

- *Website update (re-launch).
- *Build a video production team and strategy.
- *Develop and design/style guide that informs brand and collateral (with one voice).

*The 2018 Budget was reviewed by Linda

-Revenue: \$2,386,756 -Expenses: \$2,316,969

-Expected surplus: \$69,787

- -Total income is projected to remain flat.
- -Total operational expenses are projected to increase 13% over 2017 actual expenses.
- -Planned capital improvements of \$350,000 are anticipated in 2018.

*Will we ever increase the number we give to the synod given the strength of our current budget? Pas tor Chris Enstad - Yes, it is our goal to increase that amount and to recognize the importance of the ELCA to our church.

*What are the capitol expenses in the budget? Linda Zimdars - Madison campus bathrooms, replace ment of carpets, mortgage payments, Verona campus sign.

*How can we be debt free sooner than we think based on the current numbers? Tom Golden - This will be the challenge to the congregation; The Joshua Group will assist us with this goal.

*What is the Joshua Group? Tom Golden - This will be covered next in the agenda.

Motion to approve the 2018 budget and 2nd from the congregation - Motion Passes.

I am sure you don't recall, but the above bible verse is the exact same verse that I used last year in this letter. It captures two themes for me – gratitude and generosity. I am grateful to be walking with each of you at this time and in this place. And, I appreciate your generosity of time, talent, and treasure.

We are blessed. There is so much good work going on at Good Shepherd Lutheran Church that it is impossible to summarize. I will touch on a few areas, with apologies to all not mentioned here –

- Two task forces formed from your work with the Joshua Group to guide us to the future. These
 are the Shared Vision and Shared Leadership Task Forces. You will receive updates from leaders
 of these two task forces during our Annual Meeting.
- The Reconciling in Christ Task Force has taken up how we welcome all to Good Shepherd. Thank you to this team for their leadership.
- Last year we "got the band back together" and brought back committees. While we are still figuring out how all of the pieces fit together, much good work has been accomplished, and committee members are standing up and leading with distinction.
- Good Shepherd has been blessed with caring, committed, and engaged Pastors who have ministered to our congregation. Our Pastors' desire to serve us, and our community, humbles me.
- Our staff continues to do great work in service to our congregation. They are often in the background, but always working to support us as we worship, grow and serve.

Rooted and grounded in love with Christ dwelling in our hearts. As the body of Christ, this is our foundation as the faith community of Good Shepherd Church. Personally, I do my best in Christian ministry when I regularly remember that I'm grounded in Christ's love which dwells in my heart and yours.

As your part-time pastor, I continue to participate to the fullest in the pastoral duties to which I've been called. I generally preach twice a month, lead worship weekly, serve in regular rotation of pastor teaching AMPED (confirmation), and participate in leadership meetings of pastors and staff.

This past year, we've solidified the format for baptismal classes, where I rotate pastoral leadership with Pastor Dara to co-teach with Katie Wagner (Children's Ministry). I've been working with Pastor Joe, Pastor Dara and Donna Maysack (Coordinator for Volunteers, Membership & Database) to reconfigure New Member Dinners, which welcome new people more deeply into the life of our congregation. I've presided at many funerals and several weddings. The numbers of people touched by these ministries are listed in the Parochial Report page of this Annual Report. Those numbers are a snapshot of lives touched through pastoral presence in these life moments.

Along with the enormous help of Pr. Joe and Diane Kohrs (Music Ministry), I was able to coordinate our 22nd Annual Community Thanksgiving Meal, which set a record of 478 people served. I also helped coordinate our Giving Tree program, which provided 210 Christmas gifts to children in Early Childhood Development in Dane County.

I'm so thankful to work alongside Parish Nurse Deb Puchner and Pastors' Assistant Lynne Kroger as I coordinate pastoral care in our congregation. The Inreach/Congregational Care Committee has completed its first full year together, stepping into their role to provide additional insight to ways we care for each other as a congregation. Please look at their report under the Committees section of this Annual Report, along with additional metrics at the end of the report, for new initiatives that will give you an idea of the number of people to whom we provide additional spiritual care in our church family. I've also begun some minimal work on removing names from our church's database of people who have not been active in our congregation for years.

Stephen Ministry has had an active year. We'll be commissioning a new class of 9 Stephen Ministers this March who have completed 6 months of intensive training. They will join the rest of our St Ministry team. Thanks to St Ministry Leaders Allan Tereba, Gary & Sue Lewis, Karna Bouquet, and Marilyn Sharrow for their dedication in teaching this class and directing our monthly supervision sessions.

I continue to meet with a small but faithful group in our Creation Keepers Task Force. The work of this group was formalized by our church board this year. We successfully hosted a large field trip for a blue moon walk at UW Arboretum last January with an intergenerational attendance of 50 people. We raised Monarch Butter-flies in the lobbies of both church campuses. A compost team was formed to transport organic waste from our Food Pantry and Church Garden to outdoor bins at Verona Campus to create fresh compost for our Garden. We offered a popular Blessing of the Animals outdoor worship early this fall and a creation-themed Sunday morning worship in the spring. We already have another moonlit walk planned for this February. Thanks to Tim and Diane Hughes for faithfully writing an article on Creation Keeping for our church newsletter each month.

2019 holds continued work in all the ministry areas I've listed above. It's a privilege to partner with you in Jesus' name!

Pastor's Annual Report

The Body of Christ is alive and at work at Good Shepherd! This past year has been a year of blessings for me as I see the Body of Christ and many members of it at work around our church. This past year for me has been a full one of regular pastoral duties and seeing new projects come to life. What a joy it is to see the body of Christ at work in so many ways at our church.

In addition to preaching and leading worship, I had a variety of teaching opportunities this past year. They include co-leading Witnessing Whiteness about the need to talk about race (with 15 participants), starting a new study for women called Wine and Word at 4 Sisters Winebar in Verona (which is a group of ~12 women and is still meeting every Tuesday evening at 7 p.m.), I continued teaching Confirmation along with our whole pastoral team and I led a study called Wide Welcome (with ~30 attending) where we explored what the Bible says about hospitality and welcome for all people as a part of our Reconciling in Christ (RIC) Task Force.

As a part of the RIC Task force, I am hoping through more educational opportunities at Good Shepherd to continue to talk more about what it means to be a welcoming church and more specifically, what does it mean to welcome our LGBTQ+ members and neighbors. And as a part of the Adult Faith Formation Committee, chaired by Becky Baumbach, we hope to continue to bring new and creative faith building opportunities to our church. While we have hosted Bible studies, we are also thinking about how to support and grow our small group ministry and how to create space for new spiritual growth opportunities.

Our Women's Ministry hosted several events this year, including a women's retreat at Bethel Horizons Camp in Dodgeville (with 13 attendees) and our annual Advent by Candlelight event (with 140 women worshipping together). Thanks to the Women's Ministry team for helping to dream and organize more ways for women to be connected to one another and God!

2018 also marked the first growing season of our Good Shepherd Food Pantry Garden. We delivered over 1500 lbs. of produce to our Good Shepherd Food Pantry. Alongside our small garden team (*Max Seeland, Julie Johnson, Michael Tollefson, Roger Cohee and the Hanson family*) we also had over 150 volunteers of all ages give at least 1 hour of their time to helping weed, water, tend, compost and harvest in the garden. This coming spring we are excited about putting up a new garden shed for our equipment! Thank you to all who donated time, supplies and money to help our garden grow!

As a part of the Verona Campus Renewal efforts, we had a group from Good Shepherd walk in the Hometown Days parade along with our Holy CoW food truck and hand out ~1500 bottles of water with an invitation to come to our church. As I look into 2019, I am hoping to keep exploring ways to connect with the Verona community through service and connections with other churches near us.

These are the final words to the first verse of a beloved carol we sing each year at Christmas. This year it reminded me of how as God's children we lay everything at the foot of our Saviors cross. All the good and bad, our success and failure, faith and doubt, hope and fear. The hopes and fears of both the year that was and the one to come.

2018 was a launchpad for what mission and ministry will look like in the future at Good Shepherd. The Outreach Committee (OC) began meeting in January and is co-chaired by Becky Baumbach and Susi Petta. The OC spent the year diving into what mission and ministry mean at Good Shepherd and is currently going through the process of evaluating the health and vitality of each ministry team. Thank you to everyone who stepped up to help lead and share their voice in this process.

The foundation of outreach ministries at Good Shepherd is the strength of our lay leadership. The Food Pantry, Children's Clothing Closet, our Adopt-A-School partnership with Orchard Ridge, Team World Vision (TWV) and Feed My Starving Children (FMSC) ministries all benefit from dedicated and compassionate leaders who feel called by the Spirit to live out their faith in daily life through their work.

As I begin my fourth year of ministry alongside you all and during our work with the Joshua group, I find hope in the fact our ministry teams are being led by groups that are still allowing themselves to dream.

Dreams have led our Food Pantry to consider what it might look like to expand operations in a variety of ways. Dreams have led our FMSC team to double the size of our mobile pack this February. Dreams are drawing churches and people into our Team World Vision ministry to bring clean water to the world. Dreams that became a reality as we began a new Food Pantry program through our Adopt-A-School ministry to serve some of the families in desperate need at Orchard Ridge Elementary.

I find hope in the relationships that continue to grow in our communities. I find hope in meaningful work with the Meadowood Health Partnership, that accomplished over 400 individual patient visits this year. I find hope in important work with the Mellowhood Foundation that is making a difference in the lives of kids in our neighborhood. I find hope in collaborative work with Joining Forces for Families, Sub-Zero/Wolf, local school social workers and our brothers and sisters at Orchard Ridge United Church of Christ and St. Maria Goretti. Also, I see hope in new relationships being formed in Verona, led by the Verona Renewal Team, with Verona schools and the Badger Prairie Needs Network, looking at how we as a church community can come alongside organizations that share our values and do work that aligns with our mission and vision.

I find hope in our ability to reach the unchurched masses in Madison through the Holy CoW food cart ministry. We are finishing modifications to the kitchen at the Madison campus for required Health Department and other certifications. This Summer the Holy CoW will be up and running as our third campus, a church on wheels bringing a hot meal, warm hug and good Word to people throughout Madison and Verona and beyond.

My prayer for the year ahead is that we all might grow in faith and trust of our God and one another.

Facilities Report Rick Thomas, Director of Facilities

2018 was a very busy year for the Good Shepherd property committee. Early in the year we converted the parking lot lights at the Verona campus to LED. The added light and energy savings were much appreciated.

In March we remodeled the upstairs bathrooms at the Madison campus. The hallway bathrooms were completely remodeled, and the lobby bathrooms received new countertops and fixtures. The updated bathrooms look amazing. In late spring we painted the parking lot poles at Verona, which was long overdue. In August and September, we put new carpeting in the lobby and Peterson Hall at the Madison campus. Painting and wallpapering were also completed to give us an updated look for the future. Finally, in December we replaced the road sign at Verona which was dated and hard to read.

2019 looks to be a year of fewer projects, but continued maintenance will be a point of emphasis. The sign at Verona should see more improvements as new designs are made and the necessary permits are completed. Thank you for the continued support of our beautiful properties.

Children's Ministry Report Joanne Zastrow, Director

"For just as each of us has one body with many members, and these members do not all have the same function, so in Christ we, though many, form one body and each member belongs to others."

Romans 12:4

Children's ministry continues to focus on an intentional deepening of relationships:

- Deepen each child's individual relationship with Christ understanding they are a loved child of God.
- Deepen children's relationships with each other within our church community.
- Deepen relationships with the larger body of Christ as Christian brothers and sisters.

This relationship building happens both through structured learning, as wells as goofy playing and messy crafts.

Church School: For the 2018-19 church school year, curriculum shifted for the 3rd,4th & 5th-grade students. Benefits of our revised curriculum include: all families learning the same messages/bible readings on a Sunday (preschool students -adult); opportunities for service-oriented learning (both hands-on service projects and learning how members of Good Shepherd serve others); in-depth workshops on various topics (Old Testament, New Testament and the Lord's Prayer) to help prepare students for middle school confirmation ministry.

Attendance for the 2018-19 church school year as of December 2018: 235 children registered for church school; average weekly attendance is 117 kids. There are 120 youth and adults who volunteer within church school.

Summer Camp: For the summer of 2018, we continued our summer day camp offerings of morning VBS, Faith & Fitness camp and Camp Create It. New this year we offered an evening VBS with dinner. 136 children attended summer day camps at Good Shepherd (51% were not Good Shepherd members).

Baptism & First Communion: Group baptism classes are held quarterly; 40 people were welcomed into the Lord's family through Holy baptism. 51 children in Kindergarten – 7th grade received First Communion.

Learning through Music: Children continued praising the Lord through the expression of music. Church school teachers were given additional tools for incorporating music into the classrooms; music was incorporated into children's messages throughout the year, and children continued musically leading worship at various times throughout the year. 60 children are enrolled in various children and youth music programs offered at Good Shepherd.

Children's Offerings: Total children's ministry offerings for 2018 were \$3,069.42. The offerings support both local and global organizations to help support our message of caring for Christ's family. Good Shepherd received \$570.40; Clothes Closet received \$761.87; Feed My Starving Children received \$1,737.12

Little Blessings Pre-School Report Jodi Mueller, Director

Little Blessings Preschool opened at the Madison Campus in 1999. Since that time the Madison classroom has expanded and been remodeled and we have added a second location at the Verona Campus. Both locations serve several school districts. Our partnership with the Verona School District enables us to offer a Pre K classroom at the Verona Campus.

Our philosophy is based on the premise that **children learn through play in a warm and loving Christian atmosphere**. Attention is given to the child's total development with emphasis placed upon developing the child's self-concept and social skills. We use Creative Curriculum and Handwriting Without Tears models as part of our theme based curriculum.

Little Blessings Preschool is licensed by the Wisconsin Department of Children and Families. Our license allows us to enroll children aged 2 ½ - 5 years. We have received perfect marks during our inspections for the past several years!

We are blessed with experienced and caring teachers. Linda Hayes and Kelli Madden are teachers at the Verona Campus and Dana Lucash, Holly Gray and I teach at the Madison Campus. At our Verona location Janelle Heller is the Pre K teacher and Sherryl Hake and Kari Poppen are the assistant Pre K teachers. Beth Marshall teaches Musikgarten to all of our preschool classes. We are fortunate to have a very low staff turnover rate to maintain consistency year after year.

Lunch Bunch is offered at both locations two days a week. Our Spanish and Yoga classes have been very popular with families. We offer an extended day class at the Verona Campus to give families more flexibility with scheduling and to provide the children with a full day experience. This option allows the Pre K children to participate in our Christian programming.

In 2019 we will again partner with the Verona School District to offer Pre K. The children who enroll in our preschool at age three receive priority placement in our Pre K class when they are four years old.

I am very thankful for the Little Blessings families who entrust us with the care and education of their children. I am also thankful for the support of our generous congregation, the Church Board and the Good Shepherd staff.

Uplifting and spirit-filled music was offered in praise led by our talented music staff and the 100+ dedicated music volunteers of all ages.

Across two campuses, Good Shepherd has fifteen widely varied music ensembles of all ages that meet regularly for all to use their God given talents in joyful praise. Each adds a special element in worship at least once a month while growing continually in faith and musicality. Did you know that between our six children's and youth music ensembles, we have over 60 kids involved in our music ministry? Did you know that the Good Shepherd Choir at the Madison Campus has close to 40 singers! We have three dedicated worship bands at the Verona Campus leading us in engaging worship each week. We are blessed, and I am very grateful for the many volunteers who each give hours upon hours of their time to our Worship and Music Ministry! From singing in the choir or a band, to playing handbells, guitar, flute, piano, ukuleles or drums, to acting in our Drama Ministry; there is a place for "everyone!"

The Worship, Music & Arts Committee has been busy developing and implementing elements for engaging worship each week. One of many highlights this year includes artistic worship enhancement. We entered the wilderness during Lent with bare trees and branches throughout our worship spaces, over 300 butterflies took flight at the Verona Campus on Easter Sunday, and the saints on earth and in heaven adorned the cross on All Saints' Sunday. Additionally, many exciting musical services took place this year. During Lent, the Drama Ministry presented two captivating vignettes, *The Birdcage* and *The Easter Carol*, and the Good Shepherd Choir underscored Jesus' walk to the cross by presenting *Return to Me*: a choral Tenebrae service based on the Stations of the Cross. We rejoiced in the creation of the world on Earth Day Sunday worship, we blessed the animals we love on the feast day of St. Francis of Assisi, and we mourned with those caught in the face of violence in a contemplative Service of Prayer and Lament. We launched two sermon series about being *Strong and Courageous: Living Your Faith Wherever You Are* and being reminded that we are *No Longer Strangers: The Keys of Living as a Community of Faith*. We all find a common purpose in our worship. We are members of a community: called to know each other, and to accept each other, and to welcome all.

We welcomed many music groups to our worship services and concert series like the *Faithful Men* from Immanuel Lutheran Church of Watertown, to the return of the *Chicago Gargoyle Brass and Organ Ensemble* on Reformation Sunday, to hosting the 75 member *Augustana College Symphony Orchestra*, to nationally renowned singer-songwriter, Tony Memmel, to our annual Christmas Concert featuring former Director of Worship & Music, Ben Johnson-Urey and the Madison Inspirational Youth Choir. Wow! What an exciting musical year! Our concerts reach and minister to hundreds of people, and through the generous freewill offerings, we have been able to support programs within our neighborhood, the Madison area, and beyond. Through programs like these, we have opened our doors to the community, have greeted strangers, and have added additional revenue to our music program and outreach initiatives.

Looking back on 2018 shows that we are on an exciting musical and spiritual journey together. I am blessed to be on it with you.

Youth Ministry Report

AMPED CONFIRMATION MINISTRY—Sarah

For over 11 years now, it has been my honor and joy to help lead our AMPED confirmation program. Each week – and I'm not kidding here – I am awed by the questions, kindness, resilience, or understanding of our youth. It is a ministry rich blessed with people, possibility, and the presence of the Spirit.

People— It takes a lot of adult patience, wisdom, and energy to care for 110 youth, but we never have to actively seek out volunteers. We have an abundance of adults who serve as small group guides, substitutes, rovers, guest speakers, and grAMPED parents. It's not just that they show up year. It's that they show up armed with love, curiosity, humility, creativity and often a treat.

Presence - The Spirit comes to play in all sorts of ways throughout the year. That treat the guides so often provide may seem like a behavior modification tool but is often the bread they will break together as they share stories of their week which, some kids declare to be the highlight of their week.

Possibility - If you were following our congregational discussion of liminality or "in between" time during Advent you can see how liminal this season of life is. No longer children and not yet adults, there is amazing energy, curiosity, self-consciousness, and hope to Middle School youth. Consequently, more than anything we can teach them our goal remains to provide a safe and fun space for them to come each week and ask questions, encounter the Spirit, and most of all experience belonging.

While this ministry is a well loved and full program, it is also true that we live in a rapidly changing world and this ministry will have to evolve in some ways in order to continue to nurture the faith of young people at this stage of the journey.

One will be looking at community/family/cultural schedules and seeing how we can best reach into family schedules among all the other things that claim energy and time. The program structure we have developed is good but will need to adapt if we want to keep it available and appealing to busy families. This will have to be done incredibly thoughtfully, for much of what makes the program successful is in fact due to the strength of relationship, knowledge, and experience you build through consistently journeying together over weeks, months and years. We do not want to acquiesce to the demands and constraints of the world around us, we simply need to learn how to best and most fully dance within it.

The second will be a consideration of just how we can speak into what consumes the minds and hearts of our young people today. Over the past 10 years, I have seen the questions, concerns, suspicions, and hope of middle school youth change greatly. They are asking questions now that previous generations asked (openly) when they were much older. Questions about God's existence, other faiths, relativism, creation, sin, and more. They are less ready to accept an answer "just because". Is this scary – yes! Is this exciting – yes! We have a chance to walk authentically with our young people in a way that honors the messy, paradoxical, and holy nature of Truth even among the truths of their life. What will it take? It will take a congregation of adults who are also ready to dig into the messy, mysterious, and beautiful experience of faith.

To that end, I am excited to be handing over the AMPED program to Becca – with Laura of course still also at the helm - so that I can help create spaces and places for us adults to also continue to grow in our relationship, understanding, and experience of, as St. Augustine said, "the God who is always bigger".

YOUTH MINISTRY—Sarah

Tonight, at The Deep we sang, *All Creatures of Our God and King*. It was the first "Hallelujah" I sang in 2019 and it got me thinking, what it would be like to track a year in Hallelujahs?. We cry Hallelujah in times of rejoicing - as a word of praise to God. Sometimes we cry Hallelujah even in the midst of despair, confusion, or hurt. It is a word that punctuates the human conversation with God, and it is was refrain of our year in Senior High Ministry.

- Hallelujah as a response to the Chili Cook-off fundraiser that served as an opportunity for intergenerational fun and raised over \$3000 for our trip to Houston!
- **Hallelujah** is the moment when 46 youth and 6 adults, exhausted at the end of a long day at the ELCA Youth Gathering, sing the doxology over and over in the dark on their ride home.
- **Hallelujah** is the moment of liberation when, sitting among 36 other kids at a retreat, a young person shares about their story and finds love and support.
- Hallelujah is for the youth who cannot find a home in a faith community because they feel too broken or too wrong.
- Hallelujah is for the sun in the morning when we meet before school for the nourishment of pastries and prayer.
- **Hallelujah** is to the God of the long game who has former GS youth, now serving as young adult volunteers, that play, process, and journey alongside our high school youth.
- **Hallelujah** is over the bread broken at Sisterhood of the Traveling Bible Dinners, Hallelujah for the struggles recorded in their journal and Hallelujah for the way they reach out to support and journey together.
- **Hallelujah** is the moment that a youth hears from the stage of the ELCA Youth Gathering that there is Grace enough for whatever they are carrying and whatever they are called.
- **Hallelujah** is when a timid young woman on a bus with mostly strangers, finds a friend over fast food in Memphis and discovers a bus buddy and perhaps a friend for life.
- **Hallelujah** is the moment when old grief is released through tears among 30,000 others in an arena, and Hallelujah is seeing 2 high school boys literally hold up their buddy.
- Hallelujah is for the stories GS members shared about experiences that "Changed Everything" that we used as devotions on our way to Houston. Stories that awakened, connected, and comforted our young people away from home.
- Hallelujah is sitting in a church basement in Galveston TX, and hearing senior citizens share about their lifelong journey in that place about hurricanes, and friendship, and faith...and recommending The Golden Corral as the best place for lunch on the island. Hallelujah is for the feasting and laughing and talking when we actually went there
- **Hallelujah** is for the conversations with community shoppers at the BYFY rummage sale fundraiser, and for the connections made among congregation members over piles of folded clothes.
- Hallelujah is at the end of the MANY coffee/lunch dates Sarah and other volunteers have with young people trying to figure out their life plan, their identity, and their relationships.
- **Hallelujah** is a valley full of young people playing in the unexpected snow at their fall retreat no phones, no fear, rested, silly, renewed, and relaxed.
- Hallelujah is for the overscheduled, confused, busy, and seeking young people who come in the door as often as they can and for those who are journeying alone...Hallelujah for the lost and hallelujah for the found.
- **Hallelujah** is for the parents who don't know what to do next for their child, for the parents pushing their kids into participation, for the parents who trust and delight and help in this ministry.

Hallelujah punctuates our conversation with God in this ministry. We gather together at tables, on trips, and for togetherness to help each other learn to listen for the Spirit, respond to God's grace, and walk the radical walk of Jesus. Life as a young person is, in some ways, the same as it has always been but in other ways, they are navigating a world we have no map for. For many of them, finding where, and how, and why the triune God we name should be a part of their journey in this complicated world, is not always easy. And so in our playing, feasting, traveling, crying, playing, we sit together. We point to, look for, and reflect on where God is present. And even when we don't know – we at least know we are not journeying alone. Hallelujah.

Note from Becca:

As the new Director of Youth and Family, I've seen many wins already in my few months here. I see high schoolers reflecting on their spiritual walk and finding strength and comfort in this faith community as they are involved past their affirmation of baptism. I see confirmation students asking inspired questions about the Bible, God's character, the world, and their small group members. And I see a community of adults who give week after week to these groups of 6-12th graders, through being a small group guide or bringing a meal to feed the servant-hearted youth who come together to serve others. Since she was leading both groups most of the year, we thought it would be best for Sarah to summarize all the "hallelujahs" she witnessed around here. But know that you'll hear more from me next year about all the "hallelujahs" yet to come.

The Joshua Group has experience in this type of work and has been guiding the task force through the process.

What Has the SVTF Been Doing?

- The SVTF has been following the Shared Vision Process. It is made up of four parts: (1) Identity, (2) Vision Frame (what surrounds the Vision), (3) Vision Proper (the Vision itself) and (4) Integration Mode. The SVTF is focusing on the first three parts and then will turn their work over to the Board, Staff, and committees to complete the fourth part, the integration work.
- Our work began by reviewing all of the information that was collected during the Joshua Group's work earlier this year. Through a review of that material, we captured our top gifts, passions, and community or societal issues and narrowed those down into identity statements (see below).

We created a charter (see below) to clarify our work.

Charter

We believe that God has a unique purpose for Good Shepherd Lutheran Church, and has provided us with traditions, resources and opportunities to fulfill that purpose.

This SVTF Task Force will:

- 1. Review and celebrate the ideas, traditions, people and events that have made us who we are.
- 2. Give thanks for, and prayerful consideration to, our current resources, opportunities, and environment in discerning the direction God is leading us.
- 3. Paint a picture for the congregation of the church that God is calling Good Shepherd to become.

We then built our "vision frame" which includes our mission (see below), values, strategy and measures.

Background

The Shared Leadership Task Force (SLTF) was one of the task forces that came from the Joshua Group consulting work in 2017/2018 that was shared with the Congregation in early June. Since that time, a team of GSLC member volunteers (see below) have been meeting bi-weekly to address the following charter.

We believe in transparent processes and best practice church governance that builds trust and confidence through the solicitation of input, active feedback, and on-going communication. We will develop a shared leadership structure and decision-making processes that are documented in a manner that can easily be communicated to, and understood by, the Good Shepherd Lutheran Church congregation and the broader community.

To fulfill the above, the Task Force will define and clarify Good Shepherd's leadership systems, including:

- Review of the governance processes of the Board, ensuring the roles and responsibilities are consistent with Good Shepherd's Constitution and By-laws
- Review of the structure, responsibilities and decision-making practices of current and future Good Shepherd committees and the related governance processes
- Review of the Board's relationship with the pastoral team and staff

What Has the SLTF Been Doing?

The SLTF work began by reviewing Good Shepherd's Constitution and By-laws, with focus on all leadership responsibilities. We also reviewed the work coordinated by the Joshua Group, including the Congregational survey, forum recaps, one-on-one interviews, etc. to understand strengths and potential gaps in our leadership structure as understood by the Congregation.

We then completed an analysis, identifying strengths, weaknesses, opportunities, and threats as they relate to our Board's activities, our Committee's and the Congregation's role in leadership. This helped us to identify key gaps that we could address as a Task Force to strengthen our leadership system.

The SLTF divided into three sub-groups to further discuss these opportunities and worked together to identify actions that could be taken to strengthen the leadership model, improve communications and improve the governance model.

What's Next?

We will be sharing more details with the Board and the Congregation, soliciting feedback on proposed actions. This will start at the annual meeting and continue with various communication vehicles over the next couple of months.

We have been completing this work prayerfully and have felt the Holy Spirit's presence throughout. The members of the SLTF would appreciate continued prayers from the Congregation as we wrap up this work over the next couple of months.

Good Shepherd Lutheran Church Foundation Report Dean Nelson, President

We give thanks to God always for you all, making mention of you in our prayers; **1 Thessalonians 1:2**

It has been a privilege for our Foundation to be able to make over \$72,209 in grants in 2018. They included:

- \$26,467 for summer interns who managed day camps and various ministry activities throughout the summer.
- \$14,000 for scholarships to 12 Good Shepherd members attending ELCA colleges and seminaries.
- \$ 5,279 was granted to support the cost of a hearing loop for Peterson Hall.
- \$ 5,781 to assist youth in the cost of attendance at day camps and overnight camps.
- \$ 4,138 for digital signage to improve our communications at both campuses.
- \$ 2,473 for a high definition camera to document church activities.
- \$ 1,431 for the Children's Clothing Closet.
- \$ 750 to the Mellowhood Foundation to help support troubled teens in our neighborhood.
- \$ 1,000 to enhance the security system at the Madison Campus.
- \$ 5,890 for bus service transportation for the disabled and elderly to attend worship service at the Madison Campus.
- \$ 5,000 to support youth in attending the National Youth Gathering.

The total value is of our Foundation as of 12/31/2018 is: \$2,355,273, and the gifts received in 2018 totaled \$100,620.

Activities of the Foundation included engaging Thrivent to manage our investment portfolio, the participation of all Board members in education on their role and responsibilities, capturing more opportunities to share information about the work of the Foundation, and review of our systems and procedures on record retention.

We would like all members of Good Shepherd to know about our Foundation and the work it does to support Good Shepherd in carrying out its mission. It has been very heartwarming to get positive feedback from youth, college students, church members and those who live in the neighborhood as to how much these programs and services have meant to them.

Gifts to the Foundation are a lasting contribution, as the funds are invested and the earnings are used to make annual grants. They help to perpetuate the mission of Good Shepherd for years to come, long after a person has passed on to his/her heavenly home. That is why we strongly encourage members to include the Foundation in their estate planning. They truly leave a legacy for which we are so grateful.

Allied Drive Food Pantry

The Allied Drive Food Pantry is located in the Boys and Girls Club building at 4619 Jenewein Rd. We are dependent on Good Shepherd Lutheran Church for our largest amount of financial support and assistance. Many other Allied Partner churches give us support with donations and volunteers.

Shoppers are eligible to shop once every four weeks; as defined by the guidelines of the Allied Drive Food Pantry. We service zip codes 53711, 53713 and 53719. The pantry is open on Wednesdays from 10 a.m. until noon and 6 p.m. to 7:30 p.m. in the evening. We had 1,047 total household visits in 2018. The total served was 1,878 adults and 1,314 children.

Our two daytime volunteer managers alternate Tuesdays and go to the Verona Badger Prairie Needs Network Food Pantry. We receive food from Verona because they are closed on Wednesdays when we are open. After the Allied pantry finishes on Wednesday, food is taken to Good Shepherd Pantry for their Thursday pantry. This helps to eliminate as much waste as possible. Some of this food is donated to the Verona Network by Epic Systems in Verona and Kwik Trip service stations. We are grateful for their donations.

Madison Area Food Pantry Gardens supply us with produce. We receive other donations from:

- The Fitchburg Police Department, which holds an annual large food drive
- The Fitchburg Senior Center, which has a food drive for us annually
- Blackhawk Church, which holds an annual "Madison Missions" drive, from which we benefit
- The Glenwood Moravian Church, which provides a weekly financial donation and their volunteer at the pantry purchases much-needed items with the money
- MOM pantry in Middleton, which helps us by sharing their excess donations
- Thermo Fisher Scientific, which makes a monitorial donation
- Bethany United Methodist, which gives us financial donations
- The Souper Bowl at Good Shepherd, when we received hundreds of cans of soup
- Dr. Jay Hazen, which donated a supply of toothpaste and brushes
- Mary Rowe, who personally donates many boxes of diapers and wipes
- St. Dunstan Episcopalian Church, which also donates a large number of diapers and wipes
- American Family Insurance, whose food drive provides a large donation
- The Boy Scout Food Drive at Good Shepherd, which helps us greatly

We purchase food at Second Harvest at reduced cost and from the Federal Government Community Action Coalition (TEFAP) for no cost. Good Shepherd Lutheran Church's Foundation gives us large financial donations throughout the year, which greatly helps us provide food and needs for the Allied Drive and Dunn's Marsh neighborhoods.

With the great support of Good Shepherd, and all the Allied Partner Churches and individuals, we're able to help feed the Allied Drive/Dunn's Marsh neighborhood. This area has been without a grocery store for many years. We thank you all for your generosity.

On February 16-17, 2018, Good Shepherd hosted it's sixth Feed My Starving Children (FMSC) MobilePacktm event in the worship area at Verona campus. Together with the local community, over 500 volunteers were recruited, and more than \$30,000 was raised to purchase ingredients and pack 124,416 meals. This was an increase over previous years of nearly 20,000 meals. Those meals were transported by FMSC and donated to their food distribution partners in Haiti. MobilePack events at Good Shepherd have packed and funded over 725,000 meals since 2012.

FMSC offers volunteers a one-of-a-kind experience. Volunteers hand-pack rice, soy, dried vegetables and a nutritionally complete blend of vitamins and minerals into bags which are then sealed, boxed, placed on pallets and shipped to FMSC partners working hard to reach the needlest children around the world. Learn more about how FMSC is working to eliminate global hunger at fmsc.org. The next FMSC MobilePack event at Good Shepherd is scheduled for February 21-23, 2019. After encouragement from the FMSC staff, the community, the support of the Good Shepherd and prayerful consideration the goals for the next MobilePack were again increased. We served the teachers lunch during May and November conferences with money from Thrivent grants. At the beginning of the school year we provided approximately \$1,000 worth of school supplies for children who could not provide their own supplies. Good Shepherd members donated over \$2100 worth of snacks and filled 40 separate Helping Hands requests for school supplies made directly from teachers, totaling over \$950. Team World Vision

This was another fruitful year for Team World Vision at the Madison Marathon and Half Marathon. Building on the momentum of the past three years, we set out at the start of this season with audacious goals. God called 112 people to commit to running or walking the half or full marathon with us this year. By the time official training began, 72 of those people had taken the next step and signed up for our team, and our hope of achieving our God-sized fundraising goal remained strong.

Throughout the season, fear, life-circumstances, human nature, and a few injuries took their toll on our team. On November 11th we headed to the starting line with 42 dedicated participants. We praise God that everyone who began the race made it to the finish line. Our fastest half marathoner crossed the finish line in 1 hour, 48 minutes and our final full marathon finisher completed the race in 6 hours, 5 minutes. Together, we raised on average \$1,130 per team member and a collective total of \$47,498 to help fund a wide range of clean water projects in Africa. While most of these funds flowed through us from sources outside the church, we are extremely grateful for the prayerful and financial support given by the leaders and members of Good Shepherd.

As we reflect on this season, we could lament that our team fell short of our fundraising potential. It would also be natural for us to question whether we misunderstood the divine whisper of the Spirit's calling us to stride towards seemingly impossible original goals. While time spent in self-reflection on our effort and prayerful discernment of our calling is worthwhile, we need to give thanks for the remarkable things that God did in and through us this season.

The funds we raised will provide access to sources of clean water for 950 brothers and sisters in Christ. As a result of our efforts, children will be able to go to school instead of spending time fetching dirty water that will undoubtedly make them sick and potentially kill them. Women and girls in communities that gain access to clean water because we did not give up will be less exposed to human trafficking and other forms of exploitation. The health of entire communities will improve because we laced up our running shoes and stayed the course. In short, nearly 1,000 people have hope for the future in part because of our determination to move our feet for the poor.

We also need to appreciate the tangible and intangible ways team members were transformed over the course of this season. New friendships formed at our Saturday morning group runs. Participants lost weight and improved their health. Many team members overcame significant physical and emotional challenges and realized that they are capable of far more than they ever imagined was possible. We all learned about the life-changing impact that clean water has on people and communities and some teammates went the extra mile by starting a relationship with a family on the other side of the world through child sponsorship. Many teammates entered a deeper relationship with Jesus through prayerful reliance on Him throughout the season and during the race. As we strode to make a large impact in Africa, this ministry had an immeasurable impact on us too.

As we look ahead to next season and beyond, we see a bright future. As only He can do, God used the radio spots that aired on Christian radio, Life 102.5 FM at the beginning of the season to set us on a path to grow this ministry. Though our team was smaller than we hoped this year, about 20% of our members came from other churches in our area. Those fellow believers are planning to take this ministry to their congregations in 2019. We have faith that our team will be larger than ever next year and – in accordance with God's perfect plan – we will achieve even greater things together in His name.

We reviewed feedback from children and teachers, and used this to modify the 2018-19 church school curriculum for 3rd-5th graders. We analyzed data from summer camps and recommended improvements for 2019. We have also walked the spaces at both Madison and Verona campuses to provide facilities recommendations.

Moving into 2019, the Children's Ministry Committee will be combining with the Youth and Family Committee to further explore ways Good Shepherd can foster intentional engagements through each family's life journey.

This has become an intergenerational event due to children/grandchildren often participating and inviting attendees to the nametag tables to create a nametag. There has been positive feedback for this activity and additional Nametag Sundays are planned for 2019.

The Reconciling in Christ (RIC) Task Force at Good Shepherd is exploring to what degree our congregation extends a message of belonging to people of all races, socio-economic circumstances, age, sexual orientations, gender identities and expressions, political affiliations, and levels of belief or doubt, including the LGBTQ+ community. People or groups of people may not feel welcome unless specifically named in a welcoming statement. In order for Good Shepherd to adopt a welcoming statement, a congregation-wide vote would take place.

We are following a process from Reconciling Works, a Lutheran non-profit, that has been guiding churches grace-fully through welcoming conversations since 1974. (www.reconcilingworks.org) The process at Good Shepherd began 20 months ago. Information was gathered, the process was outlined and relationships were built through one-to-one conversations to gauge the congregation's temperature surrounding this work. The RIC Task Force was made official through recognition by Good Shepherd leadership and the board. The RIC Task Force shared a video to invite the congregation into deeper conversation.

Good Shepherd is currently in step 6 of an 11 step process. This step is focused on providing educational opportunities for congregation discussion. We have held a "Wide Welcome" bible study that was attended by 30 people. Additionally, resources are available for individual study on our website: gslcwi.com/RIC

This winter and spring, there will be many opportunities to share and learn together as we explore what we believe as ELCA Lutherans today. We will learn what the ELCA says in regards to inclusion or exclusion of the LGBTQ community. We will explore what the Bible says regarding homosexuality. We will discuss the current stance of the ELCA and Good Shepherd regarding gay marriage. Do you want to more deeply explore what your heart feels about these issues? Our individual and collective discussion will determine what kind of welcome we create here at Good Shepherd.

A pastor-led 4 session study, *Dialogues On: Sexuality*, will be held Tues Jan 15, 22, 29 & Feb 5 6:30—8:00 p.m., Madison Campus. A Coffee & Conversation session will be held following 9:00 a.m. worship at the Verona campus on Jan. 27, with another to follow in February at the Madison campus. If you would like to explore this topic, but feel more comfortable discussing it one on one, please email the RIC Task Force RIC@gslcwi.com.

Steps 7 - 9 take place after thorough conversation. These steps include writing a welcoming statement and conducting an exploratory survey with the congregation. If more than 75% of respondents are supportive of the welcoming statement we would then move to a congregational vote to adopt the welcoming statement.
