Christ Is Risen! We Are Free!



Dear Siblings in Christ,

Things are (not) as they are supposed to be. We have been exploring this theme of Lent as a lament, a profound truth, and yes, a confession to God. We have joined together in worship, fellowship, prayer and song even as we confront the joys of new life, the grief of loss, the pain of hurt, and even the celebration of seeing each other's faces un-masked, figuratively, and spiritually! And now, Easter! Christ is Risen! He is Risen indeed! Alleluia! Alleluia! We will soon gather in-person and online to shout and sing those words together. And what a joyous day that will be!

But guess what? Not even the Resurrection of Jesus Christ is at it should be. "But in fact, Christ has been raised from the dead, the first fruits of those who have died," Paul writes in his first letter to the Church in Corinth. How can that be? Jesus was put to death on the cross; that should have meant the end of him and his message. How can it be that Jesus has been raised from the dead? Do you see? The resurrection is not as it should be! Death is supposed to have the final say over us and our relationships with God and each other. Death is supposed to win! But God said, "No." Death shall no longer have dominion over creation. That includes you and me! The question I hold out for us in our life together in the coming season is this: what does it mean that death has no more power over us? What does it mean that we have confronted the truth

of ourselves and our masks? That we have joined in a common confession that this is not the world that is intended to be?

The theologian Karl Barth said in a sermon, "No cultural education, no art, no evolutionary development helps us beyond our sins. We must receive assistance from the ground up. Then the steep walls of our security are broken to bits, and we are forced to become humble, poor, pleading. Thus, we are driven more and more to surrender and give up all that we have, surrender, and give up those things which we formerly used to protect and defend and hold to ourselves against the voice of resurrection's truth."

How are things supposed to be? We are meant to live free from bondage to sin, free from fear, free from our masks of self-righteousness and self-sufficiency. Free to live in surrender to God's grace and mercy, and free to reflect that love to all of creation.

Join us as we walk together through Holy Week. It has been a long time since we have been able to gather around the altars of the Madison and Verona campuses to sing our Alleluias! I hope to see you there in-person (and online too!) Alleluia! Alleluia!

YOU'RE INVITED... TO TIMELESS TRADITIONS Being raised outside of the Lutheran Church, Chris Lester values liturgy. Since 2016, he has brought his voice to the Good Shepherd Community.

For those of us who have grown up in a Lutheran church, liturgy becomes habitual. Communion, the Lord's Prayer and the benediction feels routine, or even redundant. Chris Lester, however, values these traditions.

Growing up in an Evangelical church, Lester did not experience liturgical celebrations like Advent, Christmas and Easter until he attended a Presbyterian Church in Berkeley, California. During the service, Lester kept hearing, "Pay attention. Listen. Learn." After that service, he believed that churches needed to use traditions from the past to be effective in the present.

"When you cut yourself off from the previous 2000 years of church history, you've cut yourself off from the conversation that Christians have been having amongst each other about what it means to be in relationship to the Divine and in relationship to each other."

Lester brought his musical talents and appreciation for religious tradition to Good Shepherd's conversation in 2016. While he started attending worship services in Madison out of convenience, he heard that each service had a unique style. He enjoyed Verona's style and became a regular at the evening service. When a music position opened with Echoes of Grace, he transitioned to the 10:30 a.m. service. There, he was welcomed by people like Tracy Dahl and Stephanie Christensen. Lester has been using his voice with them ever since.

Lester says he has not only appreciated Dahl and Christensen's voices at Good Shepherd, but also all the voices which came before him. "All of these different voices throughout history have these perspectives that are each limited, but

each contained wisdom that we can draw from."

And by raising our voices, by sharing our perspectives, Lester thinks we can grow closer to God and each other.

"The way that you show honor and respect for God is by showing honor and respect for other people, particularly for the marginalized and the disadvantaged."

Lester says we must show honor and respect, even to those we disagree with. In his eyes, disagreement is not always a bad thing. While he did not agree with the Evangelical Church's practices, he found joy in tradition. He found Good Shepherd. Now, he hopes to offer others the same grace he has received here and from God.

"We are called to extend grace to others, not on the basis of what they deserve, but on the basis that they are created in God's image. We are called to love as we have been loved."
