Exploring The Liturgy of Politics

What does it mean to pursue Spiritual Formation for the Sake of our Neighbor?

Dear Friends in Christ,

I had the opportunity to attend the Larger Church Conference for ELCA Senior Pastors a few weeks ago. This annual conference is not sponsored by the ELCA but has been organized and supported solely by pastors and para-church sponsors for well over 20 years. It is an opportunity for leaders of multi-staff churches to come together for four days of dynamic speakers, fellowship and connection


with each other and organizations that hope to help the current and future church.

One of our guest presenters this year was **Kaitlyn Schiess,** a staff writer at Christ and Pop Culture who also happens to be one of Eric Holmer's teaching assistants at Duke Divinity School! Her book, *The Liturgy of Politics: Spiritual Formation for the Sake of Our Neighbor*, was our assigned reading for the week and formed the basis of her presentation. Her

thesis is particularly relevant to our church and our world as we enter another divisive election season in a divided culture and country: Do we know what our Bibles say about God and God's world, or do we just not care? In other words, are we aware of how our actions, beliefs and

statements reflect our beliefs and faith in Jesus? The answer, according to Schiess, lies in our spiritual formation. Most spiritual practices have tended to be intensely individualistic: e.g., judging their efficacy based on if they make us "better people" or feel "closer to God". Schiess believes the better question to ask is, "What am I being formed to love?" or, "How does this spiritual practice form me in ways that have consequences for how I treat my neighbor, sometimes through political participation?"

The crux of Schiess' argument is this: We already participate in liturgies of politics that shape us in unintentional ways and that we receive



without any real critical or second-order thinking. Many Christians believe that the church should "stay out of politics." But the reality is that our faith plays a huge part in our life with other people, which, in fact, IS political. There are many "gospels" taught to us every day whether we are aware of them or not. The prosperity, patriotism, security and supremacy gospels are just four that Schiess identifies. Ironically, none of these "gospels" are the Gospel: Jesus Christ is risen and ascended and will come again to establish the Kingdom of God here, on earth. Salvation has been won for us by Jesus Christ. The fruit of our salvation, therefore, is that Christians pledge allegiance to a new leader, and a new creation, not one that plays to our sinful, divisive and fearful natures but one that calls us to live the resurrected life in the here and now. Jesus saved us so that we might serve each other and our neighbors; free from fear of death, isolation or our own self-regard.

In short, Jesus' coming kingdom, the kingdom we catch glimpses of every day, is a kingdom of shalom. Shalom is much more than the simple word – peace. It encompasses a state of being and yearning around wholeness and intactness. It's the way things are supposed to be, not the way they are. We stand to gain deeper understandings of God's shalom if we lean into healthy conflict and abandon the status quo to bring us out of the darkness of our divisions to live truly for each other. As we enter a divided time, as residents of an already divided country, ask yourselves "Is this really the way things are supposed to be?" If your answer is "no", then let's figure out what building shalom might look like in our church and communities in the days and months to come. The word for this way of being is "diapractice": practicing our faith while remaining in close dialogue with each other around the holy sacraments. More on this to come.
